President's Column

The 2020 National Convention (Part 2)

The 2020 LWV National Convention was a virtual event and attended by several members of LWVKA. Delegates summarized the program and their experiences and this is the second of a two part report.

Convention Decisions

The LWVUS bylaws state that "the convention shall adopt a program, elect officers and directors, adopt a biennial budget, and transact such other business as may properly come before it." Here's what we did.

LWVUS Nominating Committee Chair **Sue Smith** (of Michigan) delivered the committee's report and presented the recommended slate for the 2020-2022 biennium. The newly elected LWVUS Board of Directors and the Nominating Committee is introduced here: <https://www.lwv.org/about-us/board-directors-trustees>. Our new President is **Dr. Deborah Turner**, of Omaha, NE. **Joan Hunault** of LWV Leelanau County is a Director.

LWVUS board member and Bylaws Committee chair **Melissa Currence** presented the bylaws amendments (<https://www.lwv.org/ProposedBylaws>). A two-thirds majority vote was required for adoption of each bylaws proposal.

- Amendment #1 adds a specific diversity, equity and inclusion policy.
- Amendment #2 provides for student memberships, with no PMP to be charged by LWVUS.
- Amendment proposal #3 failed. It would have eliminated the Associate Member category.
- Amendment #4 modifies the requirements regarding withdrawal of recognition of a League to fit Leagues organized as either 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) entities.
- Amendment #5 provides for removal of an LWVUS board member from office who is not properly executing the duties of that office.

LWVUS Treasurer **Jessica Lowe-Minor** delivered the report of the Treasurer indicating that our financial health is strong, with more than six months of operating expenses in reserves. **Elaine Wiant**, chair of LWVUS Budget Committee, presented the Proposed LWVUS 2020-2022 Budget and Per Member Payment (<https://www.lwv.org/ProposedBudgets>). Delegates discussed and voted to adopt both the PMP rate of \$32 (unchanged) for the 2020-2022 Biennium and the proposed budget.

LWVUS Vice-President **Karen Nicholson** presented the Proposed National Program for 2020-2022. Delegates debated and voted on the following Not-Recommended Program Items:

- Adopted abolition of the electoral college by Constitutional amendment as a LWVUS action focus for the 2020-2022 biennium.
- Adopted concurrence with LWVNM's position on the Transfer of Federal Public Land (<https://www.lwvnm.org/positions.html> about half way down).

Michigan’s Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (ICRC) has begun its work--with LWVMI monitoring closely. **Sue Smith** of the LWV Ann Arbor Area leads a team of a dozen League observers from around the state, including LWVKA’s **Denise Hartsough** Team members check that the commission follows the State Constitution as amended by Proposal 2 in 2018, as well as Robert’s Rules of Order.

Did you know? “Mother of the Equal Rights Amendment”

Michigan hero, Martha Griffiths, is known as the “Mother of the ERA.” She was the first woman sent to Congress by Michigan voters where she pushed the ERA amendment through Congress in the early 1970s. The amendment, which has not yet been added to the US Constitution, consists of one simple sentence: “*Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.*”

Recently, the Michigan Attorney General filed an amicus brief on behalf of the State to support three plaintiff states, Illinois, Nevada and Virginia, the last three states to ratify the ERA, which are asking for court recognition of the ERA as the 25th Amendment to the Constitution. The brief states, “Michigan would like to see the work of Martha Griffiths, a Michigan hero who worked tirelessly for sex equality and who championed the ERA, come to fruition. And Michigan has an interest in ensuring that its residents receive the highest level of protection from discrimination on the basis of sex, a goal that can be achieved by ensuring that the ERA’s guarantee of equality is enshrined in our nation’s most treasured document: the United States Constitution.” 



The 2020 National Convention (Part 2), continued

- Adopted the Voter Representation/Electoral Systems Concurrence (<https://www.lwv.org/sites/default/files/2020-05/2020%25252520CONCURRENCE%25252520FINAL%25252520VERSION.pdf>) to support electoral systems at each level of government that encourage participation, are verifiable and auditable and enhance representation for all voters.
- Retained all current LWVUS positions in the areas of representative government, international relations, natural resources and social policy.
- Adopted the proposed LWVUS program for 2020-2022 Campaign for Making Democracy Work®: ensuring a free, fair and accessible electoral system for all eligible voters by focusing on Voting Rights, Improving Elections and advocacy for the National Popular Vote Compact, Campaign Finance/Money in Politics and Redistricting and to continue to work on urgent issues: Climate Change, the Equal Rights Amendment, Health Care, Gun Safety, and Immigration.

Suzanne Stassevitch, Chair of the Resolutions Committee, gave the committee's report, recommending three proposals:

- Reaffirmed our commitment to Immigration reform, for efficient, expeditious immigrant entry into the United States. The League stands in solidarity with immigrants and our immigrant rights community partners. Congress must take immediate action to pass common sense, fair immigration policies that end the crisis at our borders, end the separation of families, ensure their health and safety, and provide a clear path to citizenship, including DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) young people.
- Resolved first, that the League advocates against systemic racism in the justice system and, at a minimum, for preventing excessive force and brutality by law enforcement. We also call for prompt actions by all League members to advocate within every level of government to eradicate systemic racism, and the harm that it causes; we resolve second, that the League help our elected officials

and all Americans recognize these truths to be self-evident; that Black, Indigenous and all people of color (BIPOC) deserve equal protection under the law; and that we demand solutions for the terrible wrongs done, so that regardless of race, ethnicity, religion, disability, and gender identity or sexual orientation we may truly become a nation "indivisible, with liberty and justice for all".

- Resolved that the LWVUS calls for an immediate, wide-scale, mobilization by the United States, to restore, protect and fund an ecologically sustainable environment and climate, based on an inter-related approach that is environmentally sound, science based, just and equitable, dedicated to adequately addressing the scale and speed of the global climate change emergency.

We'll all be busy! Luckily we have strong leaders to guide us and some money to support our work.

Virtual Lobby Day -LWVUS 54th Biennial Convention

Thursday June 25th League Convention delegates and members were urged to participate in a Virtual Lobby Day. This was a nationwide day of action to urge the restoration of the Voting Rights Act. The Voting Rights Advancement Act (VRAA) restores and modernizes original protections of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 with the goal of combating discriminatory practices preventing minorities, elderly and youth from voting.

The tasks were simple. We were to email and call our Senators urging support of the VRAA. Also, Leaguers could tweet the Senators between 2-3pm EDT on the 25th. As Michigan Senators Peters and Stabenow are among the sponsors of the bill, our task was easy—thanking them for their support. On September 14, the first of two Voting 101 educational sessions was hosted on Zoom to walk participants through the process of registering to vote, voting in person, voting via absentee ballot, and becoming an informed voter. Participants had an opportunity to ask relevant questions during a Q&A session at the end of the presentation. The second event will be held on October 14 on both Zoom and Facebook Live. Both events are sponsored and hosted by the Kent County Essential Needs Taskforce.

Cherry Health is once again hosting LWV volunteers at their various sites to provide voter registration and educational materials to patients visiting the facilities. All voter registration events are set up outdoors ensuring proper social distancing guidelines to protect the safety and health of volunteers and registrants. LWV has also worked with Cherry Health to develop signage that is posted in all Cherry Health medical sites which encourages patients to scan QR codes to register to vote or request an absentee ballot. We appreciate all that Cherry Health does to make sure their patients participate in elections.

LWV volunteers have distributed voter guides to all KDL and Grand Rapids Public Library branches. Copies of the guide are available for library patrons as they prepare for the upcoming election. GRPL will be hosting LWV to provide voter registration at all library branches on **October 16** and **October 17** from 10:00 am-2:00 pm. Calhoun County Unit

During these critical months our Calhoun Geographical Unit has continued to learn and grow as we move forward with League work. Unit members and volunteers from A Philip Randolph Institute have held registration drives and shared information with hundreds of voters in Battle Creek at food distribu-

tion sites, working with South Central Michigan Food Bank. Members shared information and registered voters at Albion's Farmer's Market and concert and remain involved in Albion's Unity group. Community members have now become involved in sharing the importance of voting. We have formed relationships with the A Philip Randolph Institute, Albion's Call for Unity, Albion College and Albion's NAACP and AAUW. The LWVKA Calhoun Unit has adopted safe practices to apply to any registration events.

For National Voter Registration Day we worked with administration and student organizations at Albion College and Albion's NAACP to hold a registration event at the college. 135 students were registered and much information was shared. Through interactions with leaders from the college, our unit, NAACP and AAUW, the college has taken the initiative to adopt a strong program to promote student registration and voting. 411 Voter Guides were shared with the college as well as a senior housing area, two local businesses and the organizations involved with the event.

Calhoun has completed its submissions to the 411 Voter Guide and is in the process of distributing the guides and posters/flyers to libraries, schools, clerks, churches and other organizations and businesses. All clerks have been contacted offering assistance, confirming ballot box locations, and sharing of the Voter Guides. All libraries have been offered the Voter Guides, information posters/flyers and attachments for flyers and posters to use on their media.

A voter education pack was shared with all county high schools with a variety of resources for in-school and virtual classroom lessons. The template for our coloring book is being shared with all elementary and middle schools.

Newspaper articles and social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram) are being used to promote registration and voting, stressing voting plans given the unknowns of Covid and possible disruptions to suppression of voting with current issues. Information has been shared on researching information that is posted on social media to discern misinformation or disinformation and LWV backed issue statements.

Lastly, the Calhoun Unit is contacting the candidates for the LWVKA for the September 30 District 63 forum. Watch for the 7 pm live forum and the recording on the Kalamazoo and Calhoun sites. We are learning much from our mentor chapter and are thankful for their support and leadership. 🇺🇸

Clerks began mailing out absent voter ballots the week of September 21st. They are available for early in-person voting at the clerks' offices through November 2nd—the day before the election.



Vote Yes for Homes for All!

The LWVKA Board has endorsed and urges you to support the Homes for All millage proposal that will appear on the November 3rd ballot of Kalamazoo County voters. The .75 millage would generate \$6.2 million annually for eight years.

Funds would: a) serve 200 families each year with rapid rehousing and rent subsidies; b) help housing developers over the eight years create 900 units of permanent affordable housing in Kalamazoo County.

The number of people counted as homeless in Kalamazoo County rose from 374 in 2016 to 639 in 2020. The local waiting list for a housing subsidy known as a Section 8 voucher has been closed to new applicants since 2006. Federal and state solutions fall short of addressing the huge gap between families' low incomes and the increasing cost of housing.

Homes for All is a local solution that would cost \$37.50 per year for a homeowner whose house has a market value of \$100,000. We can all be part of this solution.

LWVKA Supported Kalamazoo City Resolution Expanding Voting Access for November 3, 2020 Election

On September 21st, a Resolution was unanimously passed by the Kalamazoo City Commission that expands voting access for the November 3, 2020 election.

LWVKA joined **Voters Not Politicians**, **NAACP of Kalamazoo**, **WeVote**, **Kalamazoo YWCA**, and **ACLU** in supporting this resolution. Specifically, for the purpose of voter registration and issuing and receiving absentee ballots this resolution:

- Expands the hours the City Clerk's Office will be open during October to include 16 open-office hours on evenings and weekends:
 - Monday, October 19th and Tuesday October 27th—5 to 9pm
 - Saturday, October 24th — 10am to 6pm
- Provides a branch office of the City Clerk's Office at the Bernhard Center on the campus of WMU from October 5th through Election Day with the same expanded hours as the main City Clerk's Office.
 - This location will be open to all city residents.

“Additionally, first class stamps will be applied to absentee ballot return envelopes. . .”

Additionally, first class stamps will be applied to absentee ballot return envelopes so that returning a ballot will be free for voters. The City Clerk's Office will also put into service four additional ballot drop boxes in various locations around the City. **Check your voter information site at Michigan.gov/vote** for the drop box locations when they become available.

This expanded voter access became available when the Clerk's Office was able to acquire temporary experienced election staff, and the City Clerk, **Scott Borling**, received a grant through the **Center for Tech and Civic Life** to cover the additional expenses for these services.
